Subjective	Objective	Possessive	Determiners	Reflexive
I	me	mine	my	myself
you	you	yours	our	yourself
he	him	his	his	himself
she	her	hers	her	herself
it	it	its	its	itself
we	us	our	our	ourselves
you	you	your	your	yourselves
they	them	their	their	themselves

Subjective (Subject/nominative)

Is the form of the pronoun that you use as the subject (doer of the action)
[I/you/he/she...] **will arrive** tonight.

Objective (Accusative)

Is the form of the pronoun that you use as the object (the done-to or target) of a verb
The gossips were talking about [me/you/him/her...].

Possessive (Genitive)

Is the form of the pronoun that you use to show possession.
That book is [mine/yours/his/hers...].

Possessive Determiners

are closely related to the possessive pronouns. The difference is that the determiners (in bold) appear before the nouns (in blue) – my friend – while pronouns appear after nouns – a friend of mine. Compare the following sentences –

That is [my/your/his/her...] book.

Possessive determiners noun

That book is [mine/yours/his/hers...]

Noun possessive pronoun

Emphatic Reflexive has two uses –

Emphatic – I will do the job myself/himself/herself...

Reflexive – I wash myself, you wash yourself, etc

In the reflexive the subject and object are the same person.
